Even as we engage in this mission, we know we will find ourselves healed and transformed, and more capable of seeking and serving Christ in all people. This commitment matters because we seek to walk in the way of Jesus, spreading God's mission of healing, justice and transformation.

GIVE

Realizing that all we have comes from God, we give freely and generously of our financial resources. We want to use our money to sustain the life of the world, to sustain the life of Christ Church community, and to reflect a commitment to living as we were made to live: in interdependence and compassion, with simplicity and intention. This commitment matters because our relationship to money has everything to do with our relationship with God.

- We will share information with the full group appropriately so that everyone has the information that they need, and we will not reserve our comments for after the meeting or to be shared only with people who agree with us. We will not lobby or attempt to persuade others to see things “our” way but will attempt to see all points of view.
- We will ask for forgiveness when we hurt one another and we will offer forgiveness, in God’s time, seeking reconciliation and wholeness for all members of our committee.
- We promise to support the final decision of the Vestry whether it reflects our personal view or not.

Minutes of the 2018 Annual Meeting

Minutes of the 2018 Annual Meeting, January 28, 2018, Cummins Hall

The 72nd annual meeting of the members of Christ Church Episcopal Parish, Lake Oswego, Ore., was held at 11:30 a.m. Jan. 28, 2018. The Rev. Jeremy Lucas presided and opened the meeting with prayer.

Approval of Minutes: The minutes of the Feb. 5, 2017 annual meeting were approved as printed in the annual report.

Rector's Report:

1. Jeremy stated that when he was called to CCP four years ago to become the 7th rector of the church it was apparent the congregants were looking for something. The parish profile showed there was a desire and need for more families to join the church and for more opportunities for youth to become involved in church life. He said the church has invested in that vision; examples include the hiring of Youth Minister Naomi Woodrum, who now has 25 teens involved in the youth program, and investments made in other staff positions and the level of engagement of the vestry and congregation working to build financial health.

Twenty percent of the American population is involved in a church community, and that number has continued to drop since the 1950s. We are looking for ways to save money, as we see churches closing around us every day, and we all worry about it. But at CCP we see the nave and Cummins Hall filled with caring people wishing our church to be a place to thrive. "Be not afraid, God is with us." Jeremy is humbled to see the number of people who looked for ways to build up CCP.

There are disagreements at CCP, but this is not the first time that has happened in this parish. Some people have become frustrated and angry and have left, but Jeremy doesn't take that personally. It is a pattern of life which he sees changing. A parishioner commented that "This is our responsibility, not the staff or clergy's, but our parish."

Creative solutions are needed to move forward. There were 120 new pledges in the past four years. Three resolutions were presented by Sue Hall and Dan Breene, put forth in good faith. They are all good ideas but were not presented for acceptance since they are not unlike practices already adopted by the vestry.

1. The first resolution called for monthly financial statements to be shared with the congregation, including detailed profit and loss, balance sheet and restricted funds statements. Jeremy reminded the group those financials are already available to all upon request.
2. The second called for a quarterly parish meeting to report on progress attaining a balanced budget, facilitated by the rector, senior warden and treasurer. Jeremy stated a strategic planning committee has been in place for some time working on these very issues to become the church we want to be. All are encouraged to participate. A resolution is not needed here – the congregation must make a commitment to participate.
3. The third resolution called for CCP to convene two or three meetings to which parishioners are invited to join, facilitated by Dan Breene, Sue Hall, the treasurer and rector. Jeremy reminded the group that the Strategic Planning committee and the vestry already have this in place to open the floor to ideas of how to engage with new members. He said he has been in conversation with members of the community about sharing our space, and we need more of those ideas to keep us moving ahead financially.

Jeremy commented on rumors that salaries for employees were causing financial burden. There are five full time employees: Jeremy, Alison Schultz, Susie Coffman, Naomi Woodrum and Iain Stanford. All the staff – part-time and full-time – are called by Jesus to work and support CCP.

To paraphrase Mark Twain, “The rumors of our death have been greatly exaggerated.” Jeremy says we are moving forward, not going away from, our commitment to work together to continue God’s work. He expressed appreciation for Sue Hall’s work.

Election of Vestry: Being no nominations from the floor, the slate of Dan Breene, Kelley Elsea, Richard Genece and Ann Frazier were elected by voice vote to serve for three-year terms, beginning immediately.

Outgoing vestry members Bonnie Umland, Eleanor Suman, Brandon Stewart and Gordon Howard were present icons for their service on the vestry and given heartfelt thanks from the congregation.

The Budget, Treasurer Don Caldwell: Don Caldwell presented the budget which had already been vetted and approved by the finance committee and the vestry. He said it is a balanced, but not a finished budget as it does not include the fundraising income, from events still in planning stages to raise it.

We are looking at innovative ways from outside the parish to raise the \$105,000 shortfall. Some of those include:

- Functional information from Bookkeeper Dale Boss and Don to department heads about budgets are going out weekly electronically, to reduce printing costs.
- The budget document middle column 2017 actual shows a \$193,548 loss for 2017. After an analysis of all fund accounts the finance committee and vestry suggest CCP take \$227,000 (which includes the \$193,548 and amounts from previous years) out of the unrestricted fun to cover the deficit (\$227,000) so that the general operating fund can start with a zero balance in 2018 and go forward as a balanced account.
- Following much discussion, a motion was made by Dan Breene to transfer \$227,000 from the unrestricted account to the operating account to create a zero balance. The motion was seconded by Emily Howard. According to the bylaws to pass the motion must be approved by 70 percent of the church members present; 96 of the 126 present approved the motion.

Comments noted during the discussion included Terry Crawford’s (“The problem is people need to give money to do God’s work.”) and David Ernst’s (“We should explore the bylaw that allows us to second-guess the vestry”, referring to the 70 percent vote required to pass the motion to move the funds.)

Senior Warden’s Comments, Jack Eft: Jack stated the vestry has spent a great deal of time on the budget, knowing it was one of the larger goals of the congregation. Another priority is to make CCP attractive to new members. We are doing it. New people are coming to CCP each week and joining in. “Jump and land running!” is the phrase Jack used to describe their enthusiasm. Why do they stay? Because of our children’s programs. He said you can walk into a classroom and feel the Spirit. The Holy Spirit at CCP is real and not found elsewhere.

Regarding the budget, he said it is a goal and not who we are. He will not exploit the staff to balance the budget. “It’s different at Christ Church. We can’t walk away from the Holy Spirit. Jump and land running and pray for Christ Church.”

George Wray, Building and Grounds – Building and Grounds needs help. It is our responsibility to take care of our buildings, and we can’t hire everything to be done. All can help do something and recruit younger men to learn the skills to do things like clean gutters, etc.

Closing Prayer was led by Associate Rector Alison Schultz, who shared a daily prayer of longtime parishioner Margaret Proctor, who died in 2017.

Our Preschool is a place filled with loving, nurturing and highly educated professional teachers who carefully arrange the environment to support each child's developmental needs. We offer children the opportunity to express themselves through art, music, language and dance. They learn to cooperate and work as a team.

- At Christ Church Episcopal Preschool, we have many opportunities for children to experience new and exciting things. Weekly we offer an extended day program called Kids Club until 2:30 pm. Clubs focus on Art, Math/Games, Science, Books, and Spanish.
- The highlight of our week is chapel on Wednesday mornings. This year we have started using Godly Play as our Bible Curriculum. Ms. Susie has been coming down to each class, and telling us the story in small groups.
- CCEP has been working closely with the Clackamas Education Serve District. With our collaboration we are able to provide a wonderful preschool experience for children with special needs. ESD comes to the preschool weekly to work with students and give teachers new ideas. We are grateful for the opportunity to work with their amazing staff.
- This year CCEP was awarded a 4-star rating, out of 5, through the Oregon Child Care Quality Rating System. This is voluntary, and we took the challenge. Our Oregon Child Care Licensor felt like CCEP was one of her better programs and could rise to the challenge, The star rating was achieved through years of hard work from the staff as the certification process is long and at times rough.

We are proud to have achieved such a high rating and are looking forward to taking the steps to receive a 5-star rating.

- We are still offering amazing programs and will continue to offer these classes in the 2019-2020 school years.

prayer ...



Siblings in Christ this is your center, the center that will hold. Come and be blessed by the challenge and the solace.





This past year, I was delighted to have the opportunity to curate several shows in the *Art of Reconciliation Gallery* in Maginnis Chapel. These shows have been part of the Wisdom Center offerings.

My goals for these art shows – whether at Christ Church or other venues – have been:

- to increase the visibility of under-represented artists of color;
- to provide opportunities for these artists to sell some of their works;
- and to open the eyes of art appreciators who are used to seeing art primarily produced by white artists.

As I've become more aware of the incredibly rich diversity of the

creative people around me, I've realized more and more how narrow our white cultural view-points often are. My hope and dream is that seeing the work of artists who are new to you, and talking with them at these events, may help deepen your awareness and appreciation of their work.

In addition, I have given the bronze sculpture that is now in the Narthex to Christ Church. We plan to place it outside in front of the church. Her name is *The Prophetess*; this sculpture was one of the works inspired by my growing companionship with Native American artists. My prayer is that she will give symbolic witness that we as a congregation acknowledge the people who lived here long before we came.

Women in Spirituality (WIS) has for more than a decade offered CCP members, newcomers and visitors weekly meetings for fellowship, prayer, study, and reflection on topics that nurture spiritual growth and promote friendship. It welcomes newcomers as a portal to our parish and forges strong community as people share their insights and talents and learn together.

In 2018-2019 the theme of “Living Christ” is being explored. The Gospel of John presents Jesus as the man who lived God for us, showing us through his actions what God is like. This phrase also suggests that Christ lives in us, members of the body of Christ, animated by Jesus, endowed with spiritual gifts. In WIS we hope to learn to share those gifts with others through relationship, friendship and support of one another.

Working with a steering committee of five each summer we create a theme and weekly programs for the following year (excepting holidays when the church is closed, Christmas and Holy Week) September through May and drawing on our member’s suggestions and participation. This positive approach to volunteerism based on careful use of our talents and experience has fostered friendship and deep relationship within WIS and CCP.

This fall we began with a spiritual photographic journey to Namibia, followed by a small group discussion session on defining the qualities we understand to be Christian, defining our theme of “Living Christ”. We followed the next week with a presentation on “Practicing the Presence of God”, then continued with a presentation on St. Joan of Arc and other favorite saints. “Radical Inclusiveness, a Bible Study”, followed for three weeks with the reverend Carol Hull. We heard about “The Gift of Music”, an introduction with new CCP music director, Tiffany Carter, and then Liz Washburn presented “Healing Stories of the Bible”, three weeks of involving all of us in the healing traditions of Christianity. We closed fall 2018 with the Third Annual Christmas Play and Celebration, a creation by Sandra Williams and a lively cast of WIS members, photos above from this year, and past years. WIS is an informal group focused on a safe, inclusive and respectful weekly meeting facilitating relationships.

We have a full slate of programs planned for January to May 2019 and hope all interested in getting to know our Parish will join in. All are welcome each Monday noon to 1:30 pm, sack lunch optional, coffee and tea provided (sometimes cookies!) Friendship guaranteed!

Children's Ministry

*"Am I allowed to wear my hat to church?" ...
"Can you give the communion bread recipe to my mom?" ... "Does God have a parent?"* So many questions have been asked as the kids prepare to leave for Sunday School each Sunday morning. We stand by the windows (not so quietly) because we are excited to be with our friends and hear the answer to the weekly question. The clergy bravely take on the question of the day and all of us, young and old, learn something from it. Sunday School is all about hearing the stories of our Christian Faith, asking lots of questions and becoming the hands and hearts of Jesus in the community.

Speaking of community...we build it every Sunday at those beautiful windows and in our classrooms. It doesn't stop there! Our kids have so many places to belong, to learn, to grow. They come to our camps all summer long. They build new friendships, fortify old ones and gain new understandings of who they are in the eyes of the one who created them. They "bring their parents" to Parent's Night Out monthly. Oh we know it's a night out for parents but the kids will tell you it's really about their night in with each other! This is pure fellowship for them! They have dinner together, they play games and do art and watch movies. We spend a solid three hours together and it's not easy to break it up at the end of the evening! In November as we ended our movie and parents arrived for pick up, one of

our 5th graders popped her head up and said *"What do ya mean it's over!?! We're not done playing!"*

"Why are we telling this story again? Didn't we just tell it last year?" This question was posed by a 3rd grader on the first day of Christmas Pageant practice! The best part of this moment was I didn't answer the question... the kids did. *"Well, we tell it every year because not everyone was here last year and it's not the same story anyway. Sometimes the innkeeper tells it, sometimes the shepherds tell it, sometimes the angel tells it and one year a camel told it without ever talking!"* All true! We do love to tell the story every year and this year 40 kids did just that. Two cranky and exhausted innkeepers encountered kings, shepherds, travelers, angels and eventually found their own way to the manger.

Saint Nicholas traveled to us from 4th Century Myra near his Feast Day to tell us his story and encourage us to get out into the world and do for others. We learned how he cared for a poor family in his town and he was glad to learn that we make blankets for children in crisis through Project Linus and we stuff socks with personal care items for the homeless in Portland. When we all do something to help others, we are truly showing Christ's light.

As adults, do you ever look back at childhood and say to yourself *"Ahhh those were the days! Nothing to worry about.... just playing with friends and folks taking care of us!"* I sometimes do that but I'm reminded in my work that kids do carry burdens and they need places and ways to talk about it. During one of our monthly Tree House Youth Group gatherings, kids began to talk about how they were treated by others at school and there was some real hurt residing in many of our kids. Very organically, they began to tell each other how they handled things, who they went to for help and gave support and understanding to one another. Knowing you are not alone is a real gift and these kids made that clear.

At Christ Church, my hope is that we always provide space for learning and growing, room for sharing and supporting, time for fellowship and fun, and avenues to reach out to the world around us. We have a full full calendar year to achieve this in many special and creative ways!

We also made a trip to Sauvie Island and completed the corn maze and hung out at the pumpkin patch. The weather was 75 degrees and it was extremely crowded, but we had a fantastic time! For our next event, I decided that we would use one of our Well nights and have a "Friendsgiving" celebration. We ate fondue, played games, and created compliment jars!

We also brought in the Koi Fusion food truck for our dinner during a Well night and this was a refreshing change. We added another new event in December where some of our youth came to church and they decorated Advent wreaths for sale and a gingerbread house that definitely got us into the holiday spirit. Jesus is clear that if we make the Kingdom our first priority, “all these other things will be given you as well” (Matt. 6:33, NJB). The Kingdom is where God provides for all that we need. It is the realm of sufficiency where we are no longer pulled here and there by anxiety about having enough. “So do not worry about tomorrow: tomorrow will take care of itself” (Matt. 6:34, NJB).

Jesus also compares the Kingdom to a mustard seed, “which, at the time of its sowing, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth. Yet once it is sown it grows into the biggest shrub of them all and puts out big branches so that the birds of the air can shelter in its shade” (Mark 4:31-32, NJB). Even a seemingly small act of generosity can grow into something far beyond what we could ever ask or imagine (see Eph. 3:20) —the creation of a community of love in this world, and beyond this world, because wherever love grows, it is stronger than death (1 Cor. 13:8).

So when we give ourselves to planting and nurturing love here on earth, our efforts will reach out beyond our own chronological existence. Indeed, if we raise funds for the creation of a community of love, we are helping God build the Kingdom. We are doing exactly what we are supposed to do as Christians. Paul is clear about this: “Make love your aim” (1 Cor. 14:1, NJB).

Community Service Willamette West Habitat for Humanity

Willamette West Habitat for Humanity had a very active year. Christ Church had four volunteer days that were well attended by a hardy bunch of great people. We will continue this wonderful tradition in 2019.

Volunteers must be sixteen years old or above, but need no prior experience. A group of very talented and dedicated “regulars” are there to train and work with the volunteers. We do concrete work, framing, sheet-rocking, painting, clean-up, finish work (towel bars, etc.), and other construction tasks as needed. All tools are provided and “newbies” can be trained to use them all with safety and skill.

There are two other programs beyond just construction of new homes. BRUSH WITH KINDNESS provides home repair (painting, yard work, deck and fence repair, etc.) for senior citizens and veterans who cannot afford or physically cannot do that work themselves. CRITICAL HOME REPAIR does some of the same work with BRUSH WITH KINDNESS but is targeted toward disabled veterans and incapacitated senior citizens. Repairs are done that allows these people to remain in their homes as we do critical code compliance and repair work for them.

The RESTORE is a great way to fund Habitat home building. They sell construction material, yard equipment, cabinets, paint, etc. that donors provide the STORE for resale. They are located on Miliken Way in Beaverton. You can donate to them, purchase goods from them, volunteer to work with them, or all the above.

This is a rewarding outreach effort. We work hand in hand with the new Habitat families to build their houses, get them moved in, and watch them grow into their new homes. I “retired” from active construction work after many years due to physical limitations. I am still active on the Faith Relations Team, a group of representatives from various religious groups (Christian, Jewish, and Muslim) who are involved with and dedicated to the Habitat effort and goals at Willamette West. 2018 was an awesome year for Building and Maintenance Committee Volunteers. Without our volunteers we would not have been able to accomplish the things we did, and I THANK all who showed up for the meetings and helped us out with our projects.

Comparing Maintenance, Repairs and Utilities in 2018 our budget was for \$61,000 verses what was actually spent in these areas \$54,231, a savings of \$6,769.

There were some major expenses/repairs, such as HVAC unit at \$5,000 which works the Undercroft/Nave area; HVAC unit in the balcony area \$9,000; and a water fountain replacement at \$2,000, these were all covered by our Building Endowment Fund.

The 2019 budget has not been finalized or approved at this time.

We will continue to watch our repairs and expenses as we move into 2019. One project that we will be completing this year is the building of a shed for our storage items, this will be taking place in the first quarter of 2019 and we have a committee of volunteers, along with one of our parishioners who will be going for his "Eagle Scout Certification" from participating in this project.

One major item that should be addressed this year is the roof replacement, we are still experiencing leakage in the Women's Restroom in the Narthex.

I look forward to continuing my work with the Building and Maintenance Committee and the growth of our Community. Let us pray that we can all work together to achieve our spiritual and professional expectations.
